St Philip Howard celebrates 'Good' Ofsted rating

School is judged to be 'Good' in all areas following two-day inspection





St Philip Howard
Catholic Voluntary
Academy in Glossop is
celebrating after being
graded 'Good' in all

areas by Ofsted.

Inspectors stated in their report that the quality of education, behaviour and attitudes, personal development, leadership and management were all 'Good'. The overall effectiveness of the school, which received a grade of 'Requires Improvement' at its last inspection in January 2018, was also judged to be 'Good'.

The report highlighted a number of positives including pupils' pride in their school, the 'ambitious' curriculum and the work done by leaders to bring the school community together.

Praise was also given to the St Ralph Sherwin Catholic Multi Academy Trust and the local Governing Body.

Inspectors said: "The Trust and the Local Governing Body provide leaders with close support and challenge. Staff benefit from training provided by the Trust to improve their practice. Staff appreciate how considerate leaders are of their wellbeing and workload. They are proud to work at the school."

The report praised leaders' strong values which focus closely on doing the best for each pupil. "The school has improved a lot since its previous inspection. Leaders' commitment ensures that all pupils benefit from a good quality of education. They have made sure that the curriculum is ambitious for all pupils. Pupils learn a broad range of subjects," inspectors said.

Louisa Morris, Headteacher, said: "I am absolutely delighted that

Ofsted have recognised the hard work and commitment of the entire SPH community. We have been on a journey of continued improvement and both staff and pupils are immensely proud of the outcome. I would like to thank our parents and carers who have given me their overwhelming support since taking up the Headship in September 2015."

Sean McClafferty, Trust Chief Executive Officer, said: "As a Trust, we are all hugely proud of this outcome. For anyone who knows the school well this will not have come as a surprise. Staff, pupils and governors, supported by parents, have worked incredibly hard over many years to achieve this 'Good' judgement.

"Under the excellent leadership of Louisa Morris, St Philip Howard will continue to go from strength to strength."

Holy Rosary Catholic Voluntary Academy in Burton is relaunching "Food Bank Fridays" where children are encouraged to think about kindness and helping others by adding an item of food to the food bank trolley at school.

Food Bank Fridays at the school were initially created in 2019. Family Support Worker at Holy Rosary, Tom Miller, said: "As a school we are focusing on empathy and kindness which also links to our Gospel Values.
